

TRIBUTE: Mrs Doreen Powell



Doreen Powell became involved in pedigree dogs in 1960 in Natal, together with her late husband David, breeding and showing Boxers, GSD's, Miniature Schnauzers and Whippets under the affix "Galaxy". In 1977 they settled in Cape Town where they both continued their work in the Kennel Union, David serving on Federal Council and Doreen became involved with the Kennel Association. Her husband David passed away in 1984.

She held and still holds the following positions:

1978 – Secretary and Director of Training, Kennel Association

2000 - Elected Vice President of KUSA

2000 - Elected Vice Chairman of the KUSA Federal Council

2004 - Elected Life Member of KUSA

2007 – Elected Secretary, President and Life Member of the Western Province Boxer Club President and Vice-President of numerous clubs

Doreen is a Boxer Specialist Judge, Boxer Breed Assessor, All Breeds Conformation Judge and Class C Obedience Judge.

During the late 1990's, attention was drawn to the potential side-effects of vaccination by both medical and veterinary authorities. As a result ideal vaccination protocols have been hotly debated ever since.

The following are extracts from an article published in *In Practice (January 2009)* **31** *2-7*. The author graduated from Pretoria University in 1993, followed by 7½ years in mixed and small animal practice in the UK and a residency at Cambridge. Returning to South Africa in 2007, she established a small animal referral practice in Port Elizabeth. CURRENT VACCINATIONS STRATEGIES IN DOGS AND CATS

MATERNALLY DERIVED ANTIBODIES AND THE WINDOW OF SUSCEPTIBILITY

Neonates (newborns) absorb antibodies from colostrum (milk produced by mother immediately after birth). The amount of antigen available in colostrum depends on the immune status and disease history of the mother. The amount absorbed varies between individuals in the litter according to how much colostrum is taken in. The half-life of maternally derived antibodies ranges from seven to 15 days, depending on the antigen, and antibody levels decrease at a uniform rate. As vaccine virus is attenuated, it is also less infective than wild virus. Thus, all neonates that have maternally derived antibodies go through a stage where they have enough antibody to block effective vaccination, but not enough to prevent infection with more virulent field strains of virus. This is referred to as the window of susceptibility.

VACCINATION FREQUENCY

PUPPIES AND KITTENS

A single good quality modified live parvovirus (CPV) vaccine will trigger immunity if it is given at the correct time (i e when maternally derived antibodies have fallen low enough to allow immunisation). Only repeated serology will determine when a puppy or kitten will first be able to sero-convert (develop detectable antibodies). In most cases this is not practical. Multiple doses of vaccine are therefore given. The vaccination interval will be determined mainly by the chance exposure of the puppy or kitten to infectious disease, but should be no less than every two weeks. If given more frequently, interferon mounted in response to the first course of vaccine will inhibit antibody synthesis triggered by the second. Killed vaccines should be used no more than four weeks apart, otherwise they will lose their priming effect. Note, however, these are generalisations and manufacturers' recommendations on the use of a specific product should be adhered to.

ADULTS

In the case of canine viral antigens, adult boosters are expected to seroconvert the few dogs that have experienced a decline in immunity. In a group of 144 pet dogs in the UK that had not been vaccinated for 3 to 15 years, 95% had protective canine parvovirus titres, 72% had protective canine distemper virus titres and 82% had protective canine adenovirus titres. O'Driscoll (1997), a lay author, questioned whether annual vaccination was necessary and even harmful. This was

broadcast on television and started a public debate. The author's concerns were based on the findings of Duval and Giger (1996), who reported an association between autoimmune haemolytic anaemia and recent vaccination in dogs. In addition epidemiological studies linked an increase in the number of cases of aggressive sarcoma at injection sites in cats in the USA with adjuvanted rabies or feline leukaemia virus vaccines.

These concerns initiated a debate about extended vaccination intervals, which subsequently led to vaccines being divided into two groups: core and non-core vaccines. Core vaccines are indicated for all animals, but non-core are only required for those individuals in which lifestyle, concurrent diseases or geographic situations place them at greater risk from rare or relatively less pathogenic agents.

CORE VACCINES	NON-CORE VACCINES
Canine parvovirus	Rabies (obligatory where endemic and for travelling to/from endemic areas)
Canine distemper virus	Parainfluenza, bordetella species (indicated for kennelling and shows)
Canine adenovirus	Canine coronavirus (indicated if virus has been isolated in outbreaks)
Leptospira species	Babesia (indicated in endemic areas)

Core vaccines are highly effective; safe; protective against diseases that have a high mortality or are highly infectious; protective against zoonoses.

Non-core vaccines, meanwhile:

Protect against diseases with a low mortality or those that may be treated effectively; protect against diseases that only specific population segments are at risk from.

ADOLESCENTS

In general, a booster at 12 to 15 months of age is essential in both dogs and cats, as it seroconverts those individuals that, for some reason, did not respond to the initial course of vaccination.


EXTENDED BOOSTER VACCINATION INTERVALS

DOGS

Several multivalent vaccines are supported by challenge studies for an extended vaccination interval of three years (Nobivac range, Intervet/Schering-Plough; Duramune range, Fort Dodge) or four years (Procyon range, Intervet/Schering-Plough) for the core canine antigens (canine parvovirus, canine distemper virus and canine adenovirus). Pfizer has serological data to support a three year duration of immunity for its Vanguard vaccines. Rabies vaccines are usually supported by challenge studies for a three year duration of immunity. It seems unlikely that more frequent vaccination with these particular products will result in an improved immunity in the vast majority of dogs. As experience has shown that all vaccines are not necessarily equal, it would be logical to use only vaccines that have data to support an extended duration of immunity in this manner. More frequent vaccination could be considered in the face of an outbreak or if animals are malnourished or carry a severe worm burden when initially vaccinated. Leptospirosis vaccines are killed bacterins and although challenge studies show that immunity is maintained for a year, it is thought likely that it will not persist for much longer than this. Therefore, leptospirosis vaccines need to be given annually if protection is thought to be desirable.

CRUFTS AND TAIL DOCKING

dfsCRUFTS ENTRIES RELEASED BY KENNEL CLUB


Kennel Club entry figures for dfsCrufts revealed that 21 422 dogs would be competing, a small drop of 400.

Overall the number of dogs competing had fallen 2.4% compared to last year, but the greatest proportion of the fall had come from amongst those breeds that were traditionally docked and are no longer allowed to be shown. Amongst the dogs with the biggest numerical drops were traditionally docked breeds including Boxers (down by 67 from 254 to 187), Cocker Spaniels (down by 48 from 394 to 346), Yorkshire Terriers (down 45 from 128 to 83), German Shorthaired Pointers (down 44 from 179 to 135), Rottweilers (down 43 from 315 to 272), and Dobermanns (down 42 from 220 to 178). In total, 75% of the overall fall of dog numbers between 2010 and 2011 came from the traditionally docked breeds.


